## Discover the Art of Foley: Become a Junior Sound Designer!

After reading "From Squeaky Doors to Dinosaur Roars: The Art of Sound Effects" (pages 10–11, *Piano Inspires Kids*, Summer 2025), invite students to become "Junior Foley Artists." Using everyday items, they'll create and layer sound effects to match on-screen action or their own ideas—sharpening their listening, imagination, and storytelling skills. Keep a collection of fun props—like balls, boots, chimes, or fabric—in your studio to inspire their sound experiments.

- 1. Discover the Art of Sound Design: Show & Tell Your Foley Creations
  - Tell a story with sound by designing effects for a silent video.
  - Create a short (1-minute) silent video using toys, pets, or friends.
  - Write a sound plan describing what sound is needed and when.
  - Design and record Foley effects to match the video.
  - Ask students:
    - "What was the most creative sound you made?"
    - "What part was most fun or tricky?"
    - "How did sound bring your video to life?"
    - "What makes a good Foley artist?"
    - "How did this activity change the way you'll listen to a movie?"
    - Bonus: Name your sound studio (e.g., "Crunch Soundworks") and present your work like a pro.
- 2. Explore the Mystery Sound Box
  - Focus on listening skills and sound recognition.
  - Record 3–5 mystery sounds using various objects.
  - Challenge others to guess the sound source before revealing it.
  - Explain why you chose each item and how you used it.
  - Ask students:
    - "What made the sound easy or hard to guess?"
    - "How does sound connect to memory?"
    - "Which sounds surprised your listeners the most?"
